If you are lucky, you may find the advertisement agency. That would be the **creator/author**. In most cases, however, use the company's name that is marketing their product.

The **title of the source** is the tagline for the ad. Place title within quotation marks with the period before the the end quotation mark.

The Container is where you found the image. **Google Image does not count**, it is a search engine! You have to click on the **Visit** button in the preview section to get to the page where the image is originally housed.

Title of the container is the name of the website. *Italicize.*

The last element is the **location**. Include the website's address. **Remove the HTTP://** Hyperlink the address for easy on-click access to the page and end with a period.

The **publisher** will be next to the copyright date at the bottom of the page. If it is different than the title of the source, include it. If it is the same, do not repeat the same information.

Can't find information? Leave the element blank.

Separate each element that is part of the container with a comma. Consider the container an acceptable run-on sentence.
