North Harris College changed its name to Lone Star College-North Harris in January. The name change identifies our college as part of a much larger system of colleges, Lone Star College System (LSCS), formerly North Harris Montgomery Community College District (NHMCCD), with almost 50,000 students this fall.

LSCS is composed of five colleges, seven learning centers and a University Center. LSC-North Harris campus is located near the Inter-Continental Airport.

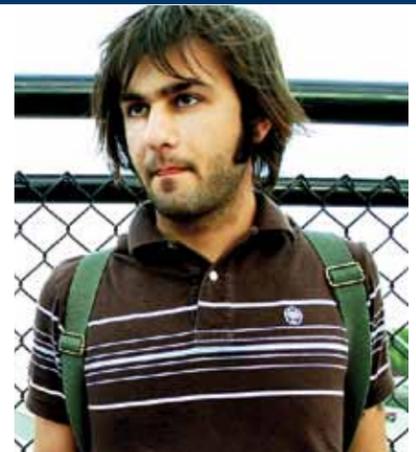
STUDENT SUCCESS SERIES Ramzi Beshara won an award, but that's just the beginning...
